Historians

A Look Back at the Past

It's official - the school year has begun in Lebanon Township and those fleets of yellow buses are back on the road. So to honor that, we're sharing some humorous excerpts from an 1858 diary of a teacher, Mr. Bruster, who taught at the Mt. Airy School in Lebanon Township. The school was located on Anthony Road and is part of a private residence today.

Tuesday December 7th,

Had some difficulty with one of the larger scholars today (disobedient & saucy), which resulted in my putting him out of school and giving him a caning into the bargain. He was a son of one of the trustees, and the spiteful one at that, so he paid me a visit tonight, blackguarded considerable, and left saying I should be turned out of the school tomorrow.

Wednesday December 8th,

About 1/2 hour before I closed school this afternoon along came the three trustees, entered the schoolhouse and seated themselves. When the school was dismissed, we talked the matter over. Some of the talk consisted in John Crevling (the offended trustee) asking me to go outside to fight him, which I politely declined by telling him if I dirtied my hands on him I should certainly be too dirty to teach school; he also said it was his wish to have me turned out of the school, but as neither of the other trustees thought that I had done anything wrong, but had acted just as I ought to have acted in the matter, and as I was willing to admit him again on promise of good behavior; he was advised to go home and give his son some advice on being civil to his teacher, and let me alone for the future.

Museum

News from the Museum ...

What words do you associate with the coronavirus pandemic? Social distancing? Isolation? Loneliness? Stagnation? How about ... Adaptation? Productivity? Creativity? Expansion?

These two sets of words are not mutually exclusive -- the lockdown was a time of tremendous growth at the Lebanon Township Museum! From the construction of the Carriage Shed Museum Annex, adding 400 square feet of exhibit space, to the creation of interpretative signage and interactive exhibits, to the discovery of little-known local history and the acquisition of artifacts, a revitalized museum awaits the public.

The museum's current exhibit, Pandemic Art & Artifact, centers around a post-pandemic renaissance featuring a collection of art created by local residents alongside historic artifacts acquired during the past 18 months. Visitors are invited to remember those we've lost to COVID in our Yellow Heart Memorial while celebrating our collective creativity and perseverance. *Exhibit runs from July through September 2021.*

One such group of local artists is the members of the Hunterdon County Quilting Guild, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization dedicated to community service projects and preserving the art of quilting. Unable to hold their regular meetings and field trips during the pandemic, members found themselves with ample time for finishing old projects and starting new ones. Enjoy the handiwork and talent of these artisans at their Biennial Quilt Show at the Lebanon Township Museum. *Exhibit on display throughout the month of October.*

The museum is open on Tuesdays from 9:00 am - 3:30 pm, Thursdays from 1:00 - 8:00 pm and Saturdays from 10:00 am - 3:30 pm. Admission is free. If you have not renewed your dog's license, it is late. The renewal fee with the late fee is now \$37 for an altered dog or \$40 for an unaltered dog. Make checks payable to Lebanon Township Dog Account. Please make sure the Rabies shot is current and good through the first 10 months of the 2021 licensing year.

Lebanon Township offers a FREE RABIES CLINIC every year for dogs and cats. The clinic is scheduled for November 6, 2021 from 9:00 am to Noon at the Lebanon Township Department of Public Works Building on the corner of Anthony and Newport Roads. Califon Animal Hospital veterinarians administer the shots. If the State allows us to have the clinic, all mandates of the State of NJ must be followed such as social distancing and wearing a mask. If the Township cannot hold the free clinic, please be sure to get your pet to the vet in a timely manner to get the rabies booster.

Please check your "Courtesy Reminder Card" for your dog's rabies expiration. 2022 licenses are due by January 31, 2022. Beginning February 1, a late fee of an additional \$25 is added.

Recycling

Recycling has Changed

Lebanon Township will no longer be holding the monthly Recycling Depot in the parking lot behind the Municipal Building. Instead, a recycling dumpster has been placed in the parking lot and is available for residents to drop off their recyclable materials at any time. The dumpster will be emptied on a weekly basis.

Please understand that it is **extremely important** that materials placed in the dumpster, are actually recyclable. The service provider scrutinizes the contents of the dumpster; if there are too many non-recyclable materials, none of the material will be recycled and will instead be sent to a landfill.

Please refer to the information below to determine whether or not something can be placed in the recycling dumpster. Detailed information is also available at <https://recyclingsimplified.com/recycling-basics/>.

DO Recycle these Items:

- Glass bottles or jars with lids attached
- Plastic bottles or jugs with lids attached
- Metal cans
- Flattened cardboard
- Non-mixed paper – remove bubble wrap from padded envelopes and plastic windows from paper envelopes

DON'T Recycle these Items:

- Plastic bags of any kind
- Items which are wet
- Items which contain food or food residue, including pizza boxes with grease residue
- Bubble wrap or Styrofoam
- Unattached lids – they are too small – instead, attach them to the bottle or jug they came from



Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient.



The Hunterdon County Residential Recycling Program is held at the Hunterdon County Transfer Station/Recycling Depot, 10 Petticoat Lane, Annandale. The Transfer Station is open Monday - Friday, 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM and Saturday, 7:00 AM to 12:45 PM. Please check their website for COVID-19 related closures.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING AT THE TRANSFER STATION:

- **Aluminum cans:** Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags:** Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Glass bottles and jars:** Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal, TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Hard covered books**
- **Junk mail & office paper:** Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Newspaper:** Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Paperback books**
- **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- **Telephone books**
- **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.

Lebanon Township and Deer, Perfect Together?

Lebanon Township is a beautiful place to live with its open spaces, rivers, forests and farms. The mix of people’s yards and farms with forests also makes very good habitat for white-tailed deer. This is why Hunterdon County has one of the highest deer densities in NJ. It is also no coincidence that Hunterdon County has one of the highest rates of Lyme disease in the state as well.

For those of us who hunt, having a lot of deer is convenient. Hunters with limited time can appreciate being able to head out early in the morning and have multiple opportunities to fill their freezers. For those of us who drive during dawn or dusk, however, having a lot of deer is not convenient at all when you have to repair your car after a run-in with deer. Local farmers will also let you know how frustrating it can be protecting their crops from the deer.

A single doe will eat five pounds of plant material a day. Thirty deer will eat two bushels of corn, or one cubic yard of plant material, each day every day.

Forests can usually sustain about 10 or 12 deer per square mile, but once you get to 20 deer per square mile or more, deer eat more than what the forest can provide. Hunterdon County has more deer than that – in some areas close to 100 deer per square mile. As a result, most of our forests either have very little vegetation growing on the ground, or they’re full of Japanese barberry and spicebush – shrubs that deer won’t eat.

We need to come together to lower the deer populations in our township for our residents, forests and wildlife. Hunters - consider targeting does to fill your freezer and donate venison to friends, neighbors, and the hungry. Non-hunters - please don’t feed the deer and consider allowing hunters onto your property. Farmers – if you don’t already have one, consider getting a depredation permit to help control the deer on your property, or allow others to hunt your property as well.

Those jumping bugs with white spots are everywhere!


In July, there were lots of black bugs with white spots, but come August there were lots of red bugs with white spots. What are they? Young spotted lanternflies.

These bugs look really neat, but they are not native to the US and pose a threat to our fruit trees, including grapes and hops. But we don’t have a lot of fruit trees around here, so why are they near our homes? Because their favorite tree to feed on is the Ailanthus, or tree of heaven.

Ailanthus trees are also not native to the US but they are abundant throughout Lebanon Township. The leaves look like leaves from a walnut, sumac, or ash tree, but the telling sign that it is Ailanthus is if you smell a strong rotten peanut butter scent after crushing some leaves or breaking a twig.

While you’re sitting in your yard sipping wine, drinking a beer, or eating the apples you just picked, watch for these bugs with white polka dots and remember that these bugs pose a threat to what you enjoy as well as the livelihood of our local farmers. If you see them, take a look around for Ailanthus trees. Soon they will be covered with adult spotted lanternflies - pretty spotted moth-like bugs. Now would be a great time to get rid of the Ailanthus, which will in turn get rid of the lanternflies. These trees will resprout if cut, so the best bet is to use herbicide. Either paint the stem or cut the stump with herbicide, or drill a hole a few inches into the tree and immediately inject about 2 milliliters of undiluted glyphosate.

Hiking Safety **By Nick Avallone, M.D.**

Like many in our rural town, our family enjoys the great outdoors. We often take advantage of the many local hiking trails in our state and county parks and have grown familiar with the terrain. However, when traveling outside of our area for family vacations in national parks, we have learned the importance of being prepared for the challenges of nature including steep terrain, rapidly changing weather conditions and wildlife.

Most trails in county, state and national parks tend to be well marked and reasonable in their degree of difficulty. However, some trails are meant for the more advanced hiker and can involve great distances, steep and uneven terrain, poorly marked turning points and challenging weather conditions. Thus, when undertaking a new hike in an unfamiliar location, it is best to obtain as much information as possible prior to embarking. Resources can include Park Rangers, acquaintances who have previously done the hike, guidebooks, maps and web postings. During one hike to the petrified forest in Yellowstone, we read beforehand about the “inhumanly steep terrain” and difficult navigation. We took plenty of breaks, had an ample supply of food and water and used multiple guidebooks to verify our path. However, we were taken by surprise when the sunny, 75 degree weather in the valley became a 45 degree, wind-driven rain 1,700 feet up at the top of Specimen Ridge. We learned that on a 6 mile hike that gains significant elevation, one has to expect the unexpected when it comes to weather conditions. Simply putting rain gear in our backpacks would have been an easy way to prepare for such a change.

Hydration and nutrition are critical when planning a hike. Hot and humid conditions or hiking at elevation certainly require drinking significant amounts of water. While every person is different, a general rule of thumb is to drink at least 1 liter of water per hour. Also, just because a person is hiking in a cold environment does not mean that it is any less important to stay well hydrated. Do not wait until your thirst tells you to take a drink as by that time you are well behind optimal hydration. Drinking at frequent intervals helps prevent the symptoms of dehydration which include cramps, fatigue, dizziness, headache, confusion and nausea. Drinking too much water can cause problems as well such as low sodium. Thus, mixing in a sports drink and eating foods with salt are a good way to help balance your electrolytes during a hike. Walking long trails burns considerable amounts of calories. Having an adequate intake of food during such exertion is important to maintain the energy required to complete a rigorous trail. Simple snacks like energy bars, trail mix and fruit are all good sources of nutrition during your day in nature.

Finally, one must always be aware of the potential for interaction with wildlife. Around our area, there are many black bears. We had an opportunity to attend a bear education session

while in Grand Teton and learned that most bears tend to shy away from human interaction. However, some human contact occurs either as a surprise to the animal or because a person was in close proximity to their cub. Making frequent noise while on a hike, particularly if one does not have a clear line of site due to a bend in the trail or thick brush, can alert a nearby bear that you are coming. If you spot a bear, do not run away as they are faster than humans and will think of you as prey and be more likely to chase after you. Stand your ground and try to remain calm. Carrying bear spray at an easy access point on your person and knowing how to quickly discharge the canister are vital to surviving a close encounter with this animal. Finally, if all else fails, and you are in the middle of an unlikely bear attack, crawl up in a ball with your chin tucked to your chest and place your hands interlocked around the back of your neck. This protects the access points to major arteries and veins that can cause rapid blood loss if injured.



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




