The Teetertown Mill in Lebanon Township-1995

A Taste Of Lebanon Township Via Texas?

Yes, you did read the title correctly. You actually can have a taste of Lebanon Township, so to speak, from Texas.

In 1760, Asher Mott inherited land and a gristmill from his father William. It had 3 grinding stones powered by an overshot waterwheel. In 1814, it was bought by John and Hannah Teeter. The little village became known as Teetertown. The mill was extensively remodeled in 1820 and was run by Teeter's son-in-law Samuel Dorland.

The Dorlands leased the mill to Henry Suydam in 1881. He replaced the overshot water wheel with a metal water-driven turbine. In 1901, George Apgar purchased the mill and installed patent rollers.

Philip and Minnie Ribbans Sliker purchased the mill in 1908. Philip was the last owner to run the mill. He processed flour under the brand name Teetertown buckwheat flour until his retirement in 1918. The mill changed hands over the years, but was never used again for its intended purpose.

By the late 1990s, the mill had deteriorated and needed to be either renovated or demolished. The owners couldn't afford the renovations so it was advertised for sale with the stipulation that it had to be moved. In the end it was purchased, carefully dismantled and moved to the Homestead Heritage Village in Elm Mott, Texas.


Today it is once again a working gristmill just as it had been built to do in the 1700s. In theory, you can have a taste of Lebanon Township by visiting the Homestead website at www.Homesteadgristmill.com, where you can purchase whole wheat flour, cornmeal and other grains and baking mixes, so painstakingly ground by our former Teetertown Mill.



The State of Our Forests

Did you know Lebanon Township owns over 200 acres of forested land? Did you also know those township-owned forested lands are currently being assessed to determine what they need to meet our goals? Those goals are yet to be determined after residents and other stakeholders weigh in, but the preliminary assessment shows that our forests may not be forests in the future if we don't act.

We've already seen what the emerald ash borer can do to ash trees, and soon we will see what beech leaf disease will do to beech trees. The death of trees will cause canopy gaps, but extra sunlight from canopy gaps allow young tree seedlings to grow, so this alone will not kill our forests. In fact, if we want our oak forests to continue to be oak forests, we need more canopy gaps so young oak seedlings can get enough sunlight to become trees.

Unfortunately, in Lebanon Township the answer to keeping our forests as forests into the future is not as simple as leaving the forests alone, creating canopy gaps or thinning the forest canopy. Our township has too many deer eating most, if not all tree seedlings and too many non-native invasive plants, like barberry, growing in the forests instead of tree seedlings. We need to take decisive action to reduce the number of deer on township-owned forests and reduce the presence of non-native invasive plants, many of which are widespread throughout all our township-owned forests.

Once both are under control we can take measures to help our oak forests stay as oak forests or whatever goals we may have for our forests into the future.

Our Road Department helps keep salt out of our drinking water

A few years ago, the Musconetcong Watershed Association (MWA) reported that some streams in our region were much saltier than expected, even in summer. Town representatives on the Musconetcong River Management Council (MRMC) worried that road salt might be contaminating local drinking water and harming aquatic life. Each representative asked their towns about their salt use.

The LTEOSC found that the Lebanon
Township Road Department already had
reduced road salt use! The trucks are
outfitted with tanks that pre-treat the salt
with magnesium chloride as it is poured
into the spreader. This makes the salt
more effective, so less is used while
keeping roads safe. LTEOSC reported our
town's efforts to the MRMC.

The MRMC asked the MWA if local salt reduction efforts were working. So, MWA planned a new study to determine if streams were salty in the summer. Salt in streams in the summer indicates that road salt might be building up in the soil and get into local well water. This would create a serious health problem for any community.

This summer, MWA ran the study.
Volunteers in several towns, including members of LTEOSC, helped collect samples from well water and nearby streams. Samples were tested for salinity, chloride, and conductivity which indicate water saltiness, and the presence of other polutants.

Christa Reeves, MWA Water Quality Program Manager was pleased to report that "water samples taken in Lebanon Township showed NO EFFECTS from road salt." Thanks, Lebanon Township Road Department for helping keep us safe AND healthy!

All de-icers contain salt that kills aquatic creatures in waterways, but some are safer for plants and animal paws. You can follow these tips to reduce YOUR salt use:

- SHOVELING often allows you to use less de-icer.
- SPRINKLE sparingly—just a coffee mug full of salt is effective on a 20-foot-long driveway
- SWITCH when temperatures change: Use salt above 15 °F, but use sand below 15 °F.
- SWEEP up salt & sand and reuse it!

Protect your Water through Septic CareBy Sharon Petzinger, LTEOSC

Like many folks, I moved to Lebanon
Township from an area with sewer service
and didn't know much about septic
systems other than to use septic-safe
toilet paper and to pump it every few
years. Recently, I attended a workshop to
learn how a septic tank works and how to
care for it.

A properly working septic system is a simple marvel, using naturally-occurring bacteria to break down waste, then slowly releasing the "clarified" water, without the sludge or scum, into the drainfield. There, the water is filtered through the soil before going to the river, stream or groundwater.

A septic system that is not working properly can contaminate our drinking water with harmful bacteria such as fecal coliform. Excessive nutrients such as nitrates and phosphorous can cause algal blooms, including the harmful algal blooms that have closed lakes and reservoirs to swimming. If you notice a bad odor near your septic tank or drain field, water in that area when it hasn't rained, or your sinks and showers are draining slowly or backing up, then your septic system is not working properly and needs to be checked out.


Even with a properly functioning septic system, there are things you can do to help keep it functioning:

 Moderate the use of harsh cleaning chemicals, such as bleach, and dilute them with water after cleaning sinks, showers and toilets.

- Do not pour oils/grease down the drain
- Stagger your high water usage to not overload your septic system with too much water. For example, wait a couple hours after draining your bath, running the dishwasher, or washing laundry, and vice versa.
- Do not plant trees or shrubs with deep roots in your drainfield.
- Have your septic tank inspected and/or pumped every 3-5 years.

Another thing you can do is have your well tested. In the graph on the next page, some wells in Lebanon Township tested positive for fecal coliform and nitrates which may indicate a septic or well problem.

Rare Paintings by Beloved Local Artist Restored and on Display

In September of 2022, a gift of four paintings of Changewater scenes created by celebrated Lebanon Township artist Don Ross were donated to the museum. These paintings were made on wooden panels with house paint in 1938 when Don was in his early twenties. They are the earliest works by the trained carpenter/self-taught artist known to exist.

A professional conservator was able to clean decades of kitchen grime and smoke from the panels. The difference is remarkable, the colors are lush and details that weren't noticed before are now easily seen. The paintings are now on permanent display in the lower level of the museum.

We offer specials like movies, a Low Vision Support Group, lectures, informative talks, music performances and many monthly events!



RECYCLING

A recycling dumpster has been placed in the rear parking lot of the Municipal Building closest to the former Rescue Squad building and is available for residents to drop off their recyclable materials at any time. The dumpster will be emptied on a weekly basis.

It is **extremely important** that materials placed in the dumpster are actually recyclable. The service provider scrutinizes the contents of the dumpster; if there are too many non-recyclable materials, none of the material will be recycled and will instead be sent to a landfill.

- Glass bottles or jars with lids attached
- · Plastic bottles or jugs with lids attached
- · Metal cans
- Flattened cardboard
- Non-mixed paper remove bubble wrap from padded envelopes and plastic windows from paper envelopes

DON'T Recycle these Items:

- · Plastic bags of any kind
- · Items which are wet
- Items which contain food or food residue, including pizza boxes with grease residue
- Bubble wrap or styrofoam
- Unattached lids they are too small attach them to the bottle or jug they came from

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING AT THE TRANSFER STATION:

Aluminum cans: Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags:

Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Glass bottles and jars: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal, TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Hard covered books & Paperback books

Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Newspaper: Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Plastics bottles # 1-7: Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.

Telephone books

Tin and bi-metal cans: Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.


